JULY 4TH PARADE, BARNEGAT LIGHT – On July 3, go back in time and enjoy a traditional small-town parade in which all are invited to participate. Involving everyone from area children to local policemen, firemen, lifeguards, first aid squad and Coast Guard members, this year's parade is themed "Hometown Heroes." Lineup is at 6:30 p.m. on West 11th Street and the parade kicks off at 7 p.m., followed by a patriotic concert by The Liberty Band in the parking lot area between 10th and Ninth streets on the bay. FOURTH OF JULY FIREWORKS, BEACH HAVEN – At 9:15 p.m. July Fourth, join fellow revelers at Ninth Street and Taylor Avenue to enjoy the Island's only Fourth of July fireworks, which will be launched from a barge behind Bay Village. Funded by contributions from local businesses and organized by the Red, White & Blue Committee, "this will be our 24th year presenting fireworks, and they're wonderful," said Committee member Caroline Kasunich. Sail on a historic schooner

FROM JULY 20 to 24, the historic A.J. Meerwald will be docked in Beach Haven, ready to accommodate up to 49 people for the each of eight sails it will make around the inlet and bay that week. Originally built in 1928 as a Delaware Bay oyster boat, the A.J. Meerwald is a fully restored traditional sailing vessel complete with canvas sails, and it was named the Official Tall Ship of New Jersey. In addition to learning about the boat's history, "passengers will enjoy an interactive experience by helping to hoist the sails and will get to see dolphins, birds and beautiful scenery on the ride," said Janis Traas, outreach coordinator for Bayshore Discovery Project.

Tickets for the two-hour sail are \$40 for adults and children 13 and older, \$35 for seniors and \$20 for children ages 3 to 12; children younger than 3 are free but still require a reservation. For more information and the sail schedule, call 856-785-2060.

ELEPHANT EAR AT CRUST & CRUMB BAKERY – Made with flaky French pastry with brown sugar, cinnamon and crushed pecans, the Crust & Crumb's Elephant Ear has been one of LBI's most tasty indulgences for more than 50 years. "We sell over 100 of these a day," bakery manager Lou Richards Jr., 22, said of the legendary treat measuring 12 inches in diameter. "It's one of those things that, once you start eating it, you can't stop." Open from 8:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. seven days a week through Labor Day, the bakery is at North Bay Avenue and Ninth Street in Beach Haven; call 609-492-4966.

WINGS AT CHICKEN OR THE EGG – Opened in 1991 by owners Mark and Craig Cohen, this landmark eatery is celebrating its 20th year in business. "Our wings really put us on the map and have won awards locally and nationally," Mark Cohen said. "They're big, juicy, come in 15 different flavors, and have a cult following on LBI." FRENCH FRIED LOBSTER TAIL AT HOWARD'S RESTAURANT – Invented by Howard Sparks in 1950, this Beach Haven establishment's signature entrée, which chef/owner Kevin Sparks describes as "crispy on the outside and tender and sweet on the inside," has been delighting visitors for more than 60 years. "It's an LBI tradition; you're not an Islander until you try it," he said. Open from 5 p.m. until after 9 p.m. seven days a week through Labor Day. JULY 7, 21, AUG. 4 AND 18 – Barnegat Light will host sand-sculpting contests for the whole family. A tradition for more than 10 years, the contests start at 2 p.m. at a well-defined area on the beach and sculptures are judged at 3 p.m.

"All creations are valued, from the smallest to the most intricate, and medallions are awarded for first, second, and third places as well as individual best, group best and others," said Nancy Manookian, deputy municipal clerk and recreation coordinator for Barnegat Light. Visit the New Jersey Surf Museum
